- 2. Opening Sentence: Write the opening sentence of the story.
- 3. Characters: Please describe two of the major characters of the story; include physical appearance and personality.
- Setting: Where and when does the story take place? (Use descriptive phrases.)
   Rising action These are the events that take place as the main character is trying to solve the problem.
- 5. Setting: Where does the story begin? Be specific (workshop, kitchen, etc.).
- 6. Problem: Write the problem that must be dealt with throughout the story.
- 7. Events: List the 3 main events/challenges the main character faces that moves the story along.
- 8. Climax: List the climax of the story.
